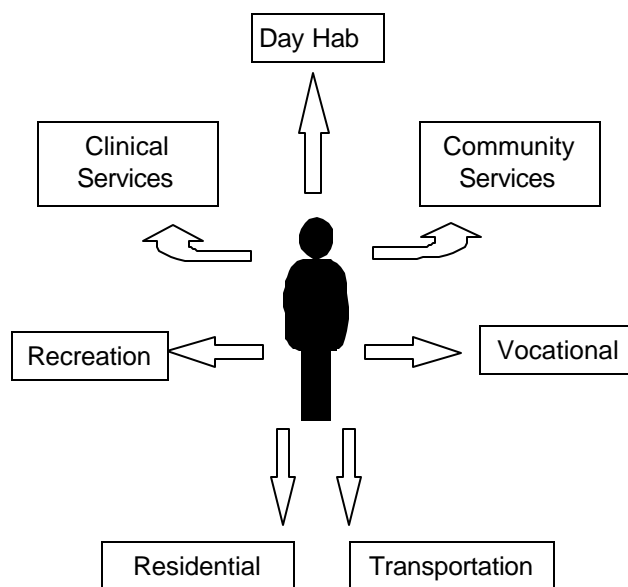
Seneca Cayuga ARC offers transition opportunities for students as they prepare to leave school.

“Transition” is defined as a coordinated set of activities which promote movement from school to post-school services for the student with a disability.

Working with the student’s school and family, our staff of professionals will develop a plan for services before the student leaves school.

Person-Centered Planning is a process in which a student’s talents and interests are considered first . This allows a better determination as to which services will help the student move closer to their own goals.

Service Options

Day Habilitation is designed to assist an individual in being a productive member of the community. Several small sites provide a base to support adults of all ages, abilities, and interests.

Lifestyles a component of Day Habilitation, offers classes that promote individuality, independence, inclusion, and productivity. Classes include performing arts, computer skills, cooking, gardening, and fine arts.

Vocational Services may begin while a student is still in school and offers work experience in a variety of situations. Services include Work Try-Out, Community-Based Assessment, Career Counseling, On-Site Individualized Training, and Job Placement.

Additional Services

Guardianship provides safeguards when a person reaches age 18, the age at which one is assumed to be legally competent to manage their own affairs. Guardianship enables a parent or appointed guardian to act on behalf of an individual with a developmental disability, ensuring that decisions are made in a person’s best interest.

Service Coordination assists individuals and families in learning about the variety of services available in the community. Service Coordinators provide information on education, housing, employment, social and recreational opportunities that help people make informed choices that are best for them.
